Second Reading Eph 5:21-32

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Ephesians

This is the great mystery, it applies to Christ and the Church.

Give way to one another in obedience to Christ. Wives should regard their husbands as they regard the Lord, since as Christ is head of the Church and saves the whole body, so is a husband the head of his wife; and as the Church submits to Christ, so should wives to their husbands, in everything. Husbands should love their wives just as Christ loved the Church and sacrificed himself for her to make her holy. He made her clean by washing her in water with a form of words, so that when he took her to himself she would be glorious, with no speck or wrinkle or anything like that, but holy and faultless. In the same way, husbands must love their wives as they love their own bodies; for a man to love his wife is for him to love himself. A man never hates his own body, but he feeds it and looks after it; and that is the way Christ treats the Church, because it is his body – and we are its living parts. For this reason, a man must leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and the two will become one body. This mystery has many implications; but I am saying it applies to Christ and the Church.

Gospel Jn 6:60-69

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

Lord, whom shall we go to? You have the words of everlasting life.

After hearing his doctrine many of the followers of Jesus said, 'This is intolerable language. How could anyone accept it?' Jesus was aware that his followers were complaining about it and said, 'Does this upset you? What if you should see the Son of Man ascend to where he was before?

'It is the spirit that gives life, the flesh has nothing to offer. The words I have spoken to you are spirit and they are life. 'But there are some of you who do not believe.' For Jesus knew from the outset those who did not believe, and who it was that would betray him. He went on, 'This is why I told you that no one could come to me unless the Father allows him.' After this, many of his disciples left him and stopped going with him.

Then Jesus said to the Twelve, 'What about you, do you want to go away too?' Simon Peter answered, 'Lord, who shall we go to? You have the message of eternal life, and we believe; we know that you are the Holy One of God.'

The Gospel of the Lord

Praise to you Lord Jesus Christ

Homily - Fr Maurice Cahill

Accepting the great truth of the Real Presence of our Lord Jesus in the Eucharist can sometimes be difficult for people joining the Catholic community through the RCIA Process. The Christian community that they grew up in might have explained the bread and wine as symbols of Christ's body and blood. The Catholic Faith has ever proclaimed the literal truth in the words of Jesus when he says that we must eat his body and drink his blood. That in the consecrated bread and wine, we receive the living Lord Jesus is the truth we stand on. It is at the heart of our Catholic Faith, and the profound mystery of the sacrifice of the Mass.

Mysterious? Yes it is! Can we give a human explanation for it? No we can't! Jesus gives us some light on the reality, saying The flesh has nothing to offer. It is the Spirit which gives life..

He is saying that human thinking and reasoning cannot give understanding of the Eucharist. Only the Spirit – the Holy Spirit – can do that. It is the Spirit who gives us the gift of faith; that makes the Blessed Sacrament real for each of us. So we accept that we are intimately present to the Lord Jesus by our reception of the consecrated bread and wine. In the RCIA Programme, one candidate, James, who *had piously worshipped as an Anglican all his life* was saying that the he just couldn't understand what Catholics were on about with the word *transubstantiation*. I asked him what used he receive when he went to Communion in the Anglican Faith? Was it bread that symbolised Christ, or was it the Lord? He was shocked that I could ask such a question. *Of course it was the Lord!* So we told him not to worry about *'transubstantiation'*. That very long word is part of a philosophical theory of St. Thomas Aquinas, indicating how it can be possible for the living Jesus to be present under the form of bread. If that theory helps people – then it helps. But no human explanation could explain the mystery. Otherwise it just would no longer be a mystery.

(One of the more consoling evidences of the real presence of the Lord would be at Lourdes. So many people are dramatically healed there. Most of them are to do with receiving Holy Communion; or at the Eucharistic Liturgy for the blessing of the sick. The Lord is giving beautiful signs that he is really present and active in the Bl. Sacrament).

But added to all this, we must choose to believe. I mean we must keep on choosing to believe that precious reality. We choose to come reverently to the altar. We have to keep choosing, because familiarity breeds contempt. We can receive Communion so often that we hardly say a real prayer. The choice is to profoundly acknowledge the living presence of the mighty, loving Lord Jesus himself. We have to keep choosing to renew our faith or it somehow wears thin. Every time I celebrate Mass, I need to stop beforehand and call to mind what it is that is about to take place – how it is the adoration of Jesus for his Father that will be taking place. What I am so used to doing can become thoughtless words unless I am constantly choosing to be prayerful and believe deeply. And so must we all as we partake in the all-holy Eucharist.

Bring your faith with you as you approach the altar for Communion.

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Light a candle for Afghanistan

Join us in prayerful silence for Afghanistan



For many of us fortunate enough to live in Australia, it's hard to fully fathom the sight of people desperately clinging to aircraft as the pilots inside prepare for takeoff. Yet, in recent days disturbing images like these, beamed from Afghanistan, have caused distress, confusion, and a general sense of uneasiness in the local community.

Fr Greg Barker, Parish Priest of Boolaroo-Warners Bay, who spent six years serving full-time as a chaplain in the Royal Australian Air Force, came up with an idea to turn his despair into a sign of hope. Fr Greg, who flew in and out of war zones during his time in Iraq in 2004, is inviting us all to light a candle with him.

Thursday 19th August at 6pm

Light a candle for the woman and girls there – a light in the dark for what may lay ahead for them. For centuries, families have lit candles in their windows to show travelers the way home. This act demonstrated that there was still hope, as small as it might be when all seemed lost

Friday 20th August at 6pm

Light a candle for those veterans among us who might be feeling that their service there, and the sacrifices that were made, were for nothing. The light will symbolise that nothing we do for others, freedom or peace, is ever wasted.

Saturday 21st August at 6pm

Light a candle for all the Christians and people of other faiths in

Afghanistan, who will now be in dire circumstances as the militants sweep through.

You might like to light a candle at the same time and join with Fr Greg in a few moments of prayerful silence or prayerful non-silence if you want to pray a few prayers. Take a picture of your candle, and I will share it around.

One light or a thousand it won't matter - it's the solidarity in prayer that matters. And for our veterans, maybe that they and their service matter to us.
