The Gospel of the Lord Praise to you Lord Jesus Christ

Homily - Fr Maurice Cahill

Time was running out for Jesus. With the Paschal feast looming, he was heading for Jerusalem and to all the tragic events which awaited him there. And he wanted urgently to spend more time training his disciples. But for the apostles, the future was looking very promising: they had been on their mission of preaching, working miracles, and even driving out demons. They were on a high. And with Jesus heading for Jerusalem, surely, they thought, this would be the time when he would triumphantly setup his wonderful Kingdom. Then they would show the world "who was who!" And they had been arguing which of them would be the *supremo?* With power, prestige on their mind, Jesus had a big lesson for them.

Who will be the greatest in my wonderful kingdom of mine? I'll tell you who! Not one strutting around feeling important; but the one who knows how to serve, not dominate; who has faith and love in heart. Such a person will have top honours. If only our Church had always remembered that!

Jesus turns human values upside down. Who are the important ones before God? The little child who got the hug was a great example. Now how did he earn such favour? It wasn't earned, except that Jesus loved the simplicity and innocence of the child. Nothing that the Lord bestows on us is ever earned.

Nor for Jesus is it enough to look good. He is definitely unimpressed with the wealth, possessions, prestige, or fame a person may have collected. Discipleship, says Jesus today, is the very opposite.

We are the disciples of a humble, homeless man (with no place to lay his head), no money or possessions.

Even the things that a person does for the Lord are not the most important issue, but what the Lord does for us. The Lord had no time for power or prestige. The only place he ever wanted to work was in the human heart. And at the final great round-up, when all will be revealed, who will be the truly great ones?

Some kings have been declared saints; some popes in our history have decidedly been villains.

And there are the Mary Mackillops of this world - the ones who have heard his call in their heart and answered it.

There are many unsung heroes who spend life caring for the poor and under-privileged - those that Jesus calls his little ones. They will be in front row in the great final gathering

Surely it will be so for many parents, great because of their love and sacrifice, who will stand among the great ones. Their God-given life work has been so loving and demanding of their own interests and pleasures. Some little old lady in nursing home who spends her time going round the rosary beads. Surely, she is reckoned as among the greatest.

Greatness to God is what is in the heart: people whose heart has been uncluttered and open to the Lord.

Lead Kindly Light:

A Message of Bishop Bill Wright on his health and ministry.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Recent times have involved many difficulties for people in our region and across New South Wales and beyond. In such times, it is the duty of a bishop to be present with his people, to encourage and support wherever he can, to provide some point of stability in a shook-up world. I am acutely conscious that for some months I have been incapable of providing that episcopal service.

At the end of June, I was an emergency admission to hospital, struggling to breathe. Despite very good care and treatment, the condition of my lungs has not improved and, we now know, is an illness from which I will not recover. Meanwhile, I am physically incapable of performing public ceremonies or of getting about without considerable assistance. I can no longer fulfil a bishop's role or duties.

Accordingly, I have written to the Holy Father, Pope Francis, submitting my resignation as bishop. What happens next is, of course, entirely up to the Holy See. In the meantime, I will effectively remain on sick leave and my place will be filled by the Vicar General and the excellent staff of the bishop's office, as has been the case these last months.

I should like to thank all of you who have sent me 'get well' wishes during my illness, and most especially those who have held me in prayer. The sensation of a peace and tranquility of spirit that come from beyond oneself has been very palpable in some of the challenging moments. May we continue to support each other in faith and love through all life's challenges.
