He who sanctifies, and those who are sanctified have one origin.

We see in Jesus one who was for a short while made lower than the angels and is now crowned with glory and splendour because he submitted to death; by God's grace he had to experience death for all mankind.

As it was his purpose to bring a great many of his sons into glory, it was appropriate that God, for whom everything exists and through whom everything exists, should make perfect, through suffering, the leader who would take them to their salvation. For the one who sanctifies, and the ones who are sanctified, are of the same stock; that is why he openly calls them brothers.

Gospel Mk 10:2-16

A reading from the Gospel according to

What God has joined together, no one must divide.

Some Pharisees approached Jesus and asked, 'Is it against the law for a man to divorce his wife?' They were testing him. He answered them, 'What did Moses command you?' 'Moses allowed us' they said 'to draw up a writ of dismissal and so to divorce.' Then Jesus said to them, 'It was because you were so unteachable that he wrote this commandment for you. But from

the beginning of creation God made them male and female. This is why a man must leave father and mother, and the two become one body. They are no longer two, therefore, but one body. So then, what God has united, man must not divide.' Back in the house the disciples questioned him again about this, and he said to them, 'The man who divorces his wife and marries another is guilty of adultery against her. And if a woman divorces her husband and marries another she is guilty of adultery too.'

People were bringing little children to him, for him to touch them. The disciples turned them away, but when Jesus saw this he was indignant and said to them, 'Let the little children come to me; do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of God belongs. I tell you solemnly, anyone who does not welcome the kingdom of God like a little child will never enter it.' Then he put his arms round them, laid his hands on them and gave them his blessing.

The Gospel of the Lord Praise to you Lord Jesus Christ

Homily - Fr John Lovell

The Catholic Church is regarded by some in our world as backward, rigid and heartless because it doesn't recognize divorce or same-sex marriage in the same way as our contemporary secular societies do. One of the main reasons for this is Jesus's response in today's Gospel to the Pharisees' question on marriage and divorce: "from the beginning God made them male and female' and "what God has united, man must not divide".

Is the Church being unmerciful or excessively pedantic in its literal adherence to these words? Some may say 'yes'. However, I think we also need to recognize the Church was established by Jesus Christ to bear witness to His teachings, both the difficult ones and the not so difficult ones. Belonging to the Church can at times put us at odds with our own opinions and those of the people around us on these and a range of other issues (eg artificial contraception, IVF, clerical celibacy, euthanasia, male only clergy, and so on). How do we handle this tension, which is really part of that Cross we accepted in becoming followers of Jesus?

Firstly, by accepting our own human limitations, so we can accept those of the people around us. Secondly, by realizing we are not called to act as moral policemen any more than Jesus or His disciples acted as policemen among the people of Israel. It was the Scribes and Pharisees who acted out that role, and they did it to the point of crucifying the Messiah in their zeal for the Law. The Lord's message to people then and to us today is one of faith, hope and love.

This does not mean we don't do our best to live by the teachings of the Church and answer people honestly when they ask us what those teachings are. But we need to recognize that life is complex and sometimes messy, that every situation is unique, and it is our reliance on the mercy of God and the merits of Jesus that will ultimately save us.
