During your life good things came your way just as bad things came the way of Lazarus. Now he is being comforted while you are in agonv.

Jesus said to the Pharisees: 'There was a rich man who used to dress in purple and fine linen and feast magnificently every day. And at his gate there lay a poor man called Lazarus, covered with sores, who longed to fill himself with the scraps that fell from the rich man's table. Dogs even came and licked his sores. Now the poor man died and was carried away by angels to the bosom of Abraham. The rich man also died and was buried.

'In his torment in Hades he looked up and saw Abraham a long way off with Lazarus in his bosom. So he cried out, "Father Abraham, pity me and send Lazarus to dip the tip of his finger in water and cool my tongue, for I am in agony in these flames." "My son," Abraham replied "remember that during your life good things come your way, just as bad things came the way of Lazarus. Now he is being comforted here while you are in agony. But that is not all: between us and you a great gulf has been fixed, to stop anyone, if he wanted to, crossing from our side to yours, and to stop any crossing from your side to ours."

'The rich man replied, "Father, I beg you then to send Lazarus to my father's house, since I have five brothers, to give them warning, so that they do not come to this place of torment too." "They have Moses and the prophets," said Abraham "let them listen to them." "Ah no, father Abraham," said the rich man "but if someone comes to them from the dead, they will repent." Then Abraham said to him, "If they will not listen either to Moses or to the prophets, they will not be convinced even if someone should rise from the dead."

Gospel Reflection

In the Old Testament, it is made very clear that how well the people are living in relationship with God is measured by how well the very least in the society are being treated. Time and again, God makes plain to the people, through the prophets, that what they are expected to do is live in right relationship with one another and with God. The cyclic rise and fall in fortune of the people of Israel is a direct result of the way in which they treat the poor and lowly of the society. When all in the society are properly cared for, Israel flourishes; but when the widows and orphans and other marginalised people are neglected and even rejected, then trouble befalls Israel. Today's first reading, from the prophet Amos, is an example of this cycle and an example of the role the prophets played in calling the people back to faithfulness with God and faithfulness with one another. Amos berates those who luxuriate in comfort whilst ignoring the plight of others.

The theme continues then into the gospel passage. The rich man lives in extravagant luxury but ignores the plight of Lazarus who is starving at his door. (This is not the same Lazarus that Jesus raised from the dead.) Both men die and, as Jesus taught over and over again, the poor man Lazarus is welcomed into the kingdom of God but the rich man, who ignored his neighbour, is trapped in Hades. When the rich man asks that Lazarus be sent back to life to warn others of the fate that awaits them, Abraham reminds him that the people of Israel have had a long line of prophets calling them back to faithfulness but their message has been ignored.

COMMUNION UNDER BOTH SPECIES

St Joseph's is preparing to reintroduce the sharing of the Precious Blood from the chalice. This is a significant moment for the East Maitland community to reflect anew on the mystery of the Eucharist and for our Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion (EMHCs) to refresh their theological understanding and practical skills. Bishop Michael has permitted parishes to resume Communion under both kinds but has asked that EMHCs first receive updated formation and training. This ensures that all ministers are aware of the current guidelines, pastoral considerations, and practical requirements of each community before recommencing this ministry. After the training, each EMHC will have the opportunity to discern whether they are ready to accept these responsibilities in the present circumstances.

Formation and training sessions will be held on Thursday, 23 October, from 2.30-3.30pm & 7:00-8:00 pm in St Joseph's Church, led by Fr Paul. Attendance to one session is compulsory for all current EMHCs, especially those who will be distributing the Precious Blood, so that we can ensure and record that everyone has been properly trained in line with diocesan requirements. We also need a sufficient number of EMHCs to cover all our Masses, as once this practice resumes it must be continued without interruption. This is also a valuable opportunity for parishioners who may feel called to join this ministry. In addition, all members of the community are warmly invited to attend, as together we deepen our appreciation of the Eucharist—the source and summit of our Christian life. Morpeth's session will be at 7pm on Wednesday 29th October in Immaculate Conception Church. Please note training will be provided in other communities at a later date.
