

Dear friends,

As the year **2025** draws to a close, our schools are preparing for the summer holidays, and children are filled with excitement as they plan their break. In our parishes too, we are approaching the **end of the liturgical year** and preparing to begin a new one (**Year A**), with **Advent and Christmas** just around the corner.

Amid this busy and joy-filled season, I would like to share with you an **update on what's happening across our parish community**—to offer greater understanding and clarity in both our **pastoral** and **administrative** areas. This is a **detailed report**, and I ask for your **patience in reading** and your **support** as we continue our shared mission of faith and service.

1. Appointment of Christopher Voigt as Pastoral Associate

We are pleased to announce that **Christopher Voigt** has been appointed by the Diocese to serve in our region as **Pastoral Associate**, commencing his role on **Monday**, **20 October 2025**.

Many of you will already know Christopher, as he has been a regular presence—especially within the **East Maitland community**—and a familiar face at our Masses. He now serves as an **Acolyte** and is continuing his formation for the **Permanent Diaconate**, preparing to serve the Church and our community more fully in the years ahead.

Christopher has previously served as a **Lay Parish Leader** for two years in Toronto, as **Office Manager to Bishop Michael** in Newcastle about two years and is now focusing more fully on his formation for the Diaconate ministry. His family is actively involved in many parish ministries, especially at **St Joseph's, East Maitland**.

We warmly **welcome Christopher** to this new role and wish him every blessing in his ministry among us. As he settles into his position, he will become increasingly involved in responding to the **pastoral needs** of our region and in building connections across our diverse parish communities.

2. Training and Formation for Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion

Recently, three training sessions for Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion (EMHCs) were held across our region—two at East Maitland and one at Morpeth. A total of 57 people attended, including both current ministers and new participants discerning this sacred ministry. After the sessions, participants renewed their commitment to ministry: some to distribute only the Consecrated Host, others the Precious Blood, and some both.

I sincerely thank all who responded generously to this call and who serve **Christ Himself** through their availability to the community.

The Importance of Regular Training

Regular training for EMHCs is vital for maintaining reverence, understanding, and consistency in the Church's liturgical life. It ensures that ministers carry out their duties with both dignity and devotion.

Upholding reverence for the Eucharist

- **Deepens faith:** Ongoing formation helps ministers grow in personal devotion and understanding of the Eucharist as the Real Presence of Christ. This revitalized faith helps them model reverence and love for the Blessed Sacrament for the entire congregation.
- **Promotes appropriate conduct:** Training ensures EMHCs know how to dress, act, and handle the consecrated hosts and vessels with the utmost care and respect, preventing irreverence and scandal.

Reinforces sacred responsibility: Regular sessions remind ministers that their role is a sacred responsibility, not simply a functional task or a position of honour.

Ensuring consistency and liturgical correctness

- **Uniform procedures:** Training provides a standard set of procedures for distributing Communion, handling mishaps (such as a dropped host or spilled Precious Blood), and preparing for Mass. This consistency creates a seamless and unified liturgical experience for the community.
- **Updated guidelines:** Liturgical norms and diocesan guidelines can change over time. Regular training keeps ministers up-to-date on proper procedures, including how to handle new health-related concerns.

Clarifying the role: EMHCs are extraordinary ministers who assist when there are not enough ordinary ministers (bishops, priests, and deacons). Training reinforces this distinction and prevents the misuse or over-reliance on extraordinary ministers.

Enhancing pastoral care for the homebound

- **Fostering connection:** Many EMHCs bring the Eucharist to the sick and homebound, an essential pastoral ministry that connects these members to the parish community.
- **Practical skills for visiting the sick**: Specialized training equips ministers with the skills to administer Communion to the sick, which includes understanding different ritual forms, bringing the day's Scripture readings, and being sensitive to a person's physical and emotional state.

Offers a prayerful presence: Ministers are trained to do more than just deliver the host; they offer companionship and prayers, turning a simple visit into a meaningful, Christ-centered encounter.

Addressing ongoing challenges

- **Overcoming misconceptions:** Regular formation helps prevent the misconception that ministers are simply distributing bread, reminding them and the faithful of the reality of Christ's presence in the Eucharist.
- **Sustaining commitment:** Ongoing training and formation help volunteers stay committed to their ministry, especially in parishes that may experience high turnover.

Building community: Group training sessions help build a sense of community and fellowship among the EMHCs, allowing them to support one another in their shared ministry.

This ministry is a profound expression of the Church's life, flowing from a deep love of the Eucharist and a desire to make Christ present among His people. For this reason, **ongoing formation and annual renewal of commitment** remain essential.

To re-establish regular ministry at Mass, we require a sufficient number of ministers to create a sustainable monthly roster. Some parishioners hesitate to volunteer, fearing over-commitment due to limited numbers—but the more who come forward, the more balanced the schedule will be.

I warmly encourage all parishioners to consider serving in this and other ministries of our parish and region. In doing so, we build up the **Mystical Body of Christ**—a community where Jesus is truly present, and where all are united as one in faith and love.

I also note that some current **Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion (EMHCs)** on the roster have not yet attended the recent training sessions. This formation is essential for all ministers, including those who bring Holy Communion to the homebound and the sick. Future rosters will be based on those who have completed the parish or regional formation.

If you missed the earlier sessions, please make every effort to attend one of the upcoming sessions: Tuesday, 18 November, at St Paul's Church, Rutherford, at 7.00 p.m. Wednesday, 19 November, at St Joseph's Church, East Maitland, at 7.00 p.m.

Together, let us strengthen our devotion and commitment in this sacred ministry of sharing Christ with others.

3. Parish Survey and Upcoming Parish/Regional Assembly

Over the past six months, **James Camden**, Director of the **Diocesan Mission & Evangelization Team**, has been visiting our region, working closely with **Bishop Michael** and the renewed diocesan team following a comprehensive review of mission initiatives.

James' mission is to **listen, learn, and dream together** about the future of our parishes and the region as a whole. His approach involves:

- Meeting with parish leaders to understand local contexts and community life
- Sharing insights from the recent diocesan discernment process
- Discussing early strategies and areas of focus currently being developed

Exploring Bishop Michael's vision for mission and evangelization across the Diocese, particularly for the Chisholm Region

In his pastoral letter dated **23 September 2025**, Bishop Michael encouraged all parishioners to **actively participate** in discerning the future direction of our parishes and communities. In consultation with the Bishop and Vicars General, **Fr George** has initiated a **Parish Survey** as a key preparatory step for the **Parish/Regional Assembly** in **February 2026**.

At the Regional Pastoral Council meeting on 2 October 2025, the proposal to conduct the survey through the National Church Life Survey (NCLS) was presented and endorsed. The survey will take place over three weekends — the last two in November and the first in December 2025 — and represents a vital stage in shaping the future mission and ministry of our Church.

According to the statutes of the **Diocesan Parish Pastoral Council**, "With the Parish Priest, the Pastoral Council will be responsible for organizing a Parish Assembly at least once during each term of the Council" (Section 5.1/2).

The **Parish/Regional Assembly** is the ideal forum for parishioners to share their insights, hopes, and concerns about the Church's mission, and to discern together as members of the **Mystical Body of Christ**. The survey will provide essential data and perspectives to guide these conversations.

I warmly encourage every parishioner to **take part in the Parish/Regional Survey** and support this important initiative. Together, let us help shape the mission, ministry, and future of the Church in our region.

4. Mass of Thanksgiving for Louise Gilchrist

Louise Gilchrist has been a valued member of our community through her **18 years of dedicated service** as **Parish Manager** in the Regional Parish Office. Her commitment and care have been deeply appreciated as she worked faithfully alongside the clergy who have served our region over the years, including those currently among us.

As Louise concludes her time in this role, we wish to express our **heartfelt gratitude and affection** for all she has contributed to our parish life. To thank her for her service and to pray for her future, a **Mass of Thanksgiving** will be celebrated on **Saturday**, **22 November 2025**, at **6.30 p.m.** at **Sacred Heart Church**, **Campbell's Hill**.

All parishioners are warmly invited to attend this **Vigil Mass** to join in thanking God for Louise's generous service, to show our appreciation, and to wish her every blessing for the years ahead.

5. Youth Ministry – A Vital Mission of the Church

Youth Ministry is an intentional way of engaging young people with the message of the Gospel. It is an invitation to be part of something greater—to step into the journey of discipleship within a community where young people can

grow in faith, discover their identity, and form lifelong friendships grounded in shared values and belief in Christ. By engaging and forming young people now, parishes ensure the ongoing vitality of faith and mission for future generations.

Youth ministry is not only an invitation to hear the **Good News of Jesus**; it is also a **challenge to follow Him**. For this reason, every youth ministry must be firmly rooted in the **Gospel message**, empowering young people to serve and evangelise in their own unique way.

In today's fast-changing world, this mission is more urgent than ever. As **Pope Paul VI** wrote in *Evangelii Nuntian-di* (14):

"Evangelising is, in fact, the grace and vocation proper to the Church, her deepest identity."

Youth ministry shares in this vocation. It must always foster a **culture of welcome**, **listening**, **and empower-ment**, inviting young people to take part in the vision and mission of the Church. When youth are entrusted with ownership of their ministry, they are inspired to share their gifts and proclaim the Gospel with joy.

Youth programs are essential for the future of the Church, especially here in Australia. They provide safe, faith-filled spaces where young people can experience God through prayer, liturgy, service, and friendship—growing as missionary disciples who live the Gospel in everyday life.

It is truly a **blessing** to have an active youth presence and vibrant programs within our region. A group of enthusiastic young people from our **Region/Parishes** will be attending the **Australian Catholic Youth Festival** (ACYF)—a national three-day celebration of faith to be held in **Melbourne from 30 November to 2 December 2025** for youth in **Year 9 to age 25**.

It is our responsibility to support such motivated youngsters to attend this festival spiritually and financially. To help support them financially, in our region we are hosting a **Trivia Night** and we'd love for you to be part of it!

November Spiritual Bouquet – Praying for the **Holy Souls**

The Church dedicates the month of November to prayer for the Holy Souls in Purgatory—our brothers and sisters who have died in God's grace but may still be undergoing purification before entering the fullness of His heavenly glory.

Helping the Holy Souls

Praying for the dead is a holy duty, rooted in Sacred **Scripture** (2 Maccabees 12:44–46; 2 Timothy 1:16–18) and reaffirmed by the Second Vatican Council (Lumen Gentium 49-50), which teaches that our spiritual union with those who have died is not broken but strengthened through the exchange of spiritual goods.
